Let's share the sweets (out) among/between everyone.

We should share (in) the reward.

🔼 😰 [[at]] If two or more people share an activity, they each do some of it:

Shall we share the driving?

We shared the preparation for the party between us, so it wasn't too much work.

(1) (I or T) If two or more people or things share a feeling, quality, or experience, they both or all have the same feeling, quality, or experience:

We share an interest in sailing.

All hospitals share some common characteristics.

I don't share your views/beliefs.

The management and the union both share in the responsibility for the crisis.

She knew that he was the person she wanted to share her life with.

[↑] to tell someone else about your thoughts, feelings, ideas, etc.:

He's not very good at sharing his worries.

It's nice to have someone you can share your problems with.

Come on, Bob, share the joke (with us).


sharing economy
